SCHOOL SAFETY CONCERNS

PLEASE do not send your children to school before 8:20 a.m. Even though the weather is better, it is too dangerous to leave your child unattended on school grounds. Our supervising teachers are on duty from 8:20 – 8:30. If your child gets hurt on our playground prior to 8:20, there won't be an adult there to help him/her.

PLEASE do not arrive before 2:50 to pick up your children. Seventh

Street does not become a one-way street until 2:50, and the police have informed us that they will ticket any violators. The best time to come is at 3:15 when there is less traffic. Supervisors stay outside with students until 3:20. At 3:20 all students that are on school property are brought inside to our office. We will contact the parents and any other people listed on the child's Emergency Form to make sure everyone has a ride home.

If no one comes for your child by 4:00 we contact the police.

KINDERGARTEN

The Kindergarten classes completed a Dr. Seuss author study in March to honor his birthday. Reading Dr. Seuss books was a great way to get more practice rhyming words. After reading Green Eggs and Ham students were able to decide on a food they would not eat in a house, or with a mouse, in a box, or with a fox! We did learn from that book that you should always TRY food before deciding if you like it.

It is such an exciting time in kindergarten because the students are using all the sounds to write and read more and more each day. They are proud of the creative sentences they have come up with. When they are writing sentences they use their

sight words and their kindergarten writing. We have also introduced diagraphs (/sh/, /ch/, and /th/) to their sound vocabulary so they are able to apply those sounds in their reading and writing too. In April we will introduce the final four kindergarten sight words: one, little, are, & here. Continue practicing flashcards often.

In Math we have begun using manipulatives to find the answer to addition story problems. Students have practiced coming up with their own addition story problems too. You can practice this skill at home using any small objects. During this quarter students will be learning to write

and solve number sentences in addition and subtraction. Keep practicing counting by ones, twos, fives, and tens.



April brings the start of our Farm Unit in Science. We will learn about the special jobs each farm animal holds on the farm. We will also learn about foods we get from farm animals. We will also be lucky enough to have a special visit from Mrs. Ensley who will bring in a few of her favorite farm animal friends from the Children's Farm in Palos. Thanks Mrs. Ensley for this wonderful hands-on experience!

FIRST GRADE

This month, in reading, first graders will focus on identifying the main idea and plot of a story. It is important to monitor your child's reading. Listen for fluency while your child is reading. Fluency develops with multiple readings of the same selection. Be sure to read and reread with your child as much as possible. Continue to study the weekly words and also take time to revisit past spelling and vocabulary words.

In phonics and spelling we will be working on the following long vowel patterns: ow as in snow, oa as in boat, igh as in night,

ay as in play, and ai as in sail. We will continue to review and practice all the short and long vowel patterns we have worked on previously.

First graders are now adding two digit numbers (without regrouping). Your child may enjoy playing store with you at home by placing price tags on several items, and adding them together to find the total. Make sure the ones and tens columns equal 9 or less.

Please continue to practice the math flashcards that are sent home with your child

until they become automatic. It is very important these math facts are mastered. Practice makes perfect!!

When we return from spring break we will be reading a story entitled "Busy Buzzy Bee." To enrich the story, the students will be doing various activities related to bees. We will learn how bees make nectar into honey, how they show other bees where to find flowers, and how bee grubs develop into adult bees.



SECOND GRADE

Reading- Our next theme is Neighborhood News! The weekly stories continue to get more complex. It will be important for you to check your child's understanding by asking them questions pertaining to the story. In spelling the students will learn: the prefixes re and pre, contractions, /oo/ sound spelled ew and ui, and diagraphs "gh" and "ph".

Social Studies- The next area of study is called "We All Work Together". Students will learn of the people in communities who offer goods and services. They will also learn about taxes, facto-

ries, producers and consumers.

Science- We will be finishing the unit on Sound. The next Unit is called "Homes for Living Things". The students will be learning about habitats for plants and animals.

Math- In school, we will not be practicing the addition facts on a daily basis. Students are still expected to continue practicing these facts at home. It is equally important to study the subtraction facts. Some upcoming skills are: identifying geometric solids, measuring and drawing line segments using centimeters, finding

perimeter, counting quarters, dimes, nickels and pennies, identifying parallel lines, representing and writing mixed numbers, and identifying right angles.

Handwriting- We are continuing to learn the lower case letters in cursive. Please remember students are not allowed to write in cursive until all letters are learned. When practicing cursive at home, remember to have good posture, sharpened pencil, and correct pencil grip.

THIRD GRADE

For the month of April your child will be working on the following concepts in each subject area:

Math: Comparing fractions, identifying fractions that equal $1/2$, adding and subtracting fractions with like denominators, fractions with mixed numbers, identifying units of weight and mass, subtraction with zeros, telling and showing time to the quarter hour, identifying and measuring line segments to the quarter inch, parallel lines, and properties of a quadrilaterals

Reading Genres: Informational fiction, Expository non-fiction, Poetry, and Realistic fiction

Reading Skills: Compare and contrast, paraphrasing, summarizing, identifying

main idea and details, and cause and effect relationships

Language Skills: Recognize and understand past-tense verbs, irregular verbs, verb forms of be, letter and persuasive writing

Spelling: Words with the suffix endings: -ed, -ing, -tion, -sion, -er, -ful, -able and changing y to i to add d or s

Science: We will continue the unit of energy, forces and motion. We will have an in school presenter which will discuss and demonstrate many of these concepts. We hope that after learning about these concepts that they will be able to make connections with the examples. After energy, forces and mo-

tion, we will begin an introduction to Earth's land.

Social Studies: The third grade will be finishing the unit of People Working Together for producing, buying and selling products and services. The next unit will introduce community and national governments.

Third grade also has an all day fieldtrip planned for May 5th to the historical sites of downtown Lockport. We will be making many connections of our social studies units to our own community and history. Please look for an informational/ permission slip very soon from your child's teacher. Please continue to promote the reading of various genres with your child and practice math facts.

News from the Art Room

Currently, all kindergarten through third grade students completed their unit on watercolor and painting and will progress into the art of ceramic sculpture. All students will focus on joinery and basic hand-built techniques for construction. Students will also experiment with subtractive elements such as texture to create interesting effects on the surface of

the clay. As a final step, students will paint their sculptures in various color schemes.

All students will also be drawing outside as we experience the warm weather. We will be observing nature, and drawing what we see all around us. Students will also learn about artists who use nature as inspiration, and

we will discuss some basic sketching techniques.

Thank you to all students, parents, teachers, administration and support staff for all your support of the arts throughout the year. It is with your patience and understanding that all our special projects are possible.

P.E. NEWS

The P.E. classes will be doing a tumbling unit in April. They will learn and practice different balances, stands, rolls, cartwheels, round-offs, and do some partner

activities. They will play a few Easter related games like, egg hunt. On Fridays, the classes will do a fitness game that involves different

exercises and running. At the end of the month, the classes always do a 5 minute run.

It's a great way to practice reading skills and have some quiet fun while settling down for sleep. If we can teach our children the habit of reading for pleasure early in their lives, they will always have that escape, no matter where life takes them. I know that when I am having a stressful week, if I can carve out some time to read quietly, I have a much better outlook when I return to the chaos of daily life. Please, let your kids see you take the time to read as well. Let the dishes pile up for another half hour - it's worth it!

Computer Lab News

Music in Our Schools Month is over, and Mrs. Randolph will be returning to the Music Room once again. All the kids seemed to have a great time learning how to identify different pitches and even composing their own songs.

Now that all classes will be getting back to their regular computer times, we will be covering some units on Internet Safety. When I started this several weeks ago I learned that nearly *all* of our students use the internet at home, which is great! I was, however, very surprised to see how many of our students participate in online gaming (much of it really meant for much more mature players) and how many claim to have their own Facebook or My Space pages! **Please**, when allowing your child

on the internet, remember to keep them in your site and to closely monitor what they are doing. Remind them constantly that they should never type in their last name, address, school name, or any other identifying information. Internet predators are very good at what they do, and can track down a child with very minimal information.

NOTES FROM THE NURSE



Importance of Sleep for children.

Kids ages 6 to 9 require about 10 hours of sleep a night. Lack of sleep for kids can cause irritable or hyper types of behavior and can also make many conditions worse. School work suffers because of an inability to concentrate due to the lack of sleep.

Bedtime difficulties can arise at this age from a child's need for private time with parents, without siblings around. Try to make a little private time just before bedtime and use it to share confidences and have small discussions, which will also prepare your child for sleep. Develop calming down routines at least 30 minutes before bed time. If you have a television in your child's room, remove it or turn it off before tucking your child in so they get the clear message it is time for sleep. Video games and other handheld devices are not calming and should never be used to get a child to sleep. Try reading a book with your child or having them read to you.

Breakfast is the most important meal of the day!

You probably heard it from your own parents: But now you're the one saying it — to your sleepy, frazzled, grumpy kids, who insist "I'm not hungry" as you try to get everyone fed and moving in the morning.

Why Bother With Breakfast?

The purpose of breakfast is to give the body the refueling it needs after going without food for 8 to 12 hours during sleep. Kids who eat breakfast tend to eat healthier overall and are more likely to participate in physical activities. Skipping breakfast can make kids feel tired, restless, or irritable. Their mood and energy can drop by mid-morning if they don't eat at least a small morning meal. Breakfast also can help keep kids' weight in check. Breakfast kick-starts the body's metabolism, the process by which the body converts the fuel in food to energy. And when the metabolism gets moving, the body starts burning calories.

Breakfast Brain Power

It's important for kids to have breakfast every day, but what they eat in the morning is crucial too. Choosing breakfast foods that are rich in whole grains, fiber, and pro-

tein while low in added sugar may boost kids' attention span, concentration, and memory — which they need to learn in school.

Research also has shown that kids who eat breakfast get fiber, calcium, and other important nutrients. They also tend to keep their weight under control, have lower blood cholesterol levels and fewer absences from school, and make fewer trips to the school nurse with stomach complaints related to hunger.

What not to serve for breakfast is important too. Sure, toaster pastries and some breakfast bars are portable, easy, and appealing to kids. But many have no more nutritional value than a candy bar and are high in sugar and calories. Read the nutrition labels carefully before you toss these breakfast bars and pastries into your shopping cart.

Providing enough time for sleep and a nutritious breakfast is the best way to help your child have a great start to each day.
